Dear Friends,

On behalf of the Team, we are pleased to present Americares India Foundation's Annual Report for 2023-24. As we navigate a world in recovery, ensuring equitable access to healthcare remains a pressing challenge. Americares India continues to strive towards bridging this gap and we extend our deepest appreciation to our donors and partners for their unwavering support in advancing our mission.

During the year 2023-24, our healthcare initiatives have significantly expanded. The year saw the expansion of our Urban Health Strategy to Bengaluru. We now have an office in Bengaluru and a 20-member strong team. The Bengaluru program will focus on providing health education and improving WASH facilities in 49 schools and provide primary health care services and health education to 14 communities. Our expansion to Bengaluru will increase our primary health care consultations by 8% and reach of school health program by over 16% in coming years. We have integrated Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) into our Mobile Health Centers and Emergency Programs, responding to the growing demand for mental health services in our communities. Additionally, we are empowering school children to advocate for health, fostering a culture of wellness within their communities.

In 2023-24 our healthcare services teams directly provided more than **2,61,000** consultations, health education to more than **1,53,000** people (in communities and schools). This included screening more than **50,000** people for hypertension and diabetes. We continue to focus on the increasing prevalence of diabetes and hypertension among disadvantaged segments of the population, by providing clients identified with these illnesses the required support and follow-up.

Our Emergency Response efforts have been instrumental in delivering swift aid during crises. We have stood by communities, providing rapid assistance in times of disasters, health emergencies and addressing their mental health needs. In 2023-2024 we responded to cyclone Biparjoy and Northern India Floods reaching out to **21,062** Families

Our Antimicrobial Stewardship initiative remains pivotal, collaborating with hospitals across states to combat hospital-associated infections and effectively address antimicrobial resistance.

With 18 years of impactful service, we are well-positioned to drive sustainable change. As climate change accelerates the frequency and intensity of natural disasters, impacting lives, livelihoods and health, we are expanding our initiatives to address climate change related health issues and working to build and strengthen climate resilient health care facilities, which will continue to provide essential health care service even during climate disasters.

These accomplishments would not have been possible without the hard work, commitment and passion of our team members. We would like to recognise their role and express our gratitude and thanks. Our partners, donors and board continue to provide us the required support, guidance and advice and on behalf of the team we would like to thank you for being part of our journey to make a meaningful difference and look forward to your continued support. Together, we are transforming lives.

We would also like to offer homage to Mr Ranjit Shahani, a long-term supporter and trustee of Americares India, who passed away on 9th March 2024. We will miss his wise counsel and guidance. We shall remain grateful for his support and contribution to making Americares India what it is today.

North India Flood

Intense monsoon rains triggered catastrophic floods across North India, submerging vast areas and displacing thousands from their homes. Infrastructure, including roads and bridges, endured significant damage. In response, we deployed aid across five districts in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand. We provided essential support such as health & hygiene kits, shelter kits, family essentials and safe drinking water kits. Our efforts reached 20,232 families, benefiting 80,928 individuals in the districts of Solan, Shimla, Kullu, and Mandi in Himachal Pradesh and Dehradun district in Uttarakhand.



Gujarat Flood response

In response to the catastrophic floods in Gujarat, caused by heavy monsoon rains that submerged communities and displaced thousands, Americares deployed an emergency response team on the ground. Our efforts included organizing 20 health camps, offering vital medical aid to 1,705 patients. Furthermore, we extended support to 2,800 families, aiding 11,200 individuals in the Kutch district by distributing crucial supplies like health and hygiene kits, shelter materials, family essentials and safe drinking water provisions.

Dhani Devi finds relief in the unexpected



Northern India faced a calamitous event as flash floods and landslides ravaged the region. The mighty River Beas, originating from the northern reaches of Himachal Pradesh, swelled beyond its banks, wreaking havoc on the surrounding areas. Amidst this turmoil stood Dhani Devi, 52, Pradhan of the village. Gratitude filled her heart as Americares Emergency team arrived with aid for her panchayat.

The Village Bran faced the river's wrath directly, Dobha and Rampur, perched uphill, suffered significant losses to their livelihoods. Dhani Devi recounted tales of lost harvests, orchards, and even homes to the relentless landslides. Miraculously, no lives were lost in her village—a fact she attributed to divine intervention. She expressed relief that the rains ceased when they did, reflecting on the perilous possibility of the entire village being swept away had the downpour persisted for just one more day.

Six days a week, our fully-equipped mobile health centres bring health care to impoverished families in identified locations. Hundreds of patients a day benefit from the medical vans' on-site services and free medicines.

In Mumbai, we operate 8 Mobile Health Centers across 130 slum locations, where patient records are meticulously maintained and analyzed using cloud-based electronic medical records.

During the year 2023-24, we served over 47,246 unique patients. Additionally, we conducted 6409 health education sessions. Private healthcare practitioners were trained in disease prevention and management techniques. We also established 263 referral linkages, facilitating the transfer of 6307 patients to higher-level healthcare facilities.



Under Project Uday, we currently operate 5 mobile health centers in Tamil Nadu, Chhattisgarh and Bihar. In 2023-24, our outreach efforts connected with over 90,626 individuals and included more than 4458 health education sessions. Moreover, our program has expanded to Bengaluru, where we introduced 1 new mobile health unit in the 2023-24 fiscal year.

Fatima finds hope in her life's challenges



Fatima, a 12-year-old girl residing in Malvani slum, Malad, faced adversity due to disability, compounded by financial struggles exacerbated by the COVID-19 outbreak. Her father, a courier delivery person, and her homemaker mother, supported Fatima and her younger brother. Despite initial efforts at Nair Hospital, the family found it challenging to sustain treatment due to distance and financial constraints.

Through Americares referral network, Fatima's journey took a positive turn. Our health worker collaborated with the referral network coordinator, leading to vital support. The coordination facilitated the acquisition of a disability certificate, crucial for accessing government aid. The involvement of Nair Hospital's Mental Health department expedited this process.

Continued advocacy yielded further assistance from the Silver Inning Foundation, resulting in the donation of a wheelchair and educational materials. Fatima's parents expressed profound gratitude, for supporting their daughter. With the wheelchair, Fatima can now engage with friends, explore new skills and experience moments of joy previously hindered by immobility.

During the fiscal year spanning April 2023 to March 2024, our Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) program achieved significant milestones in community care. Our physicians conducted a total of 2,451 consultations, focusing on diagnosis and treatment. Counselors played a pivotal role, offering 1,728 consultations aimed at providing psychosocial support, with an additional 753 consultations dedicated to assisting Non-Communicable Disease (NCD) patients in managing distress related to their illnesses. Moreover, counselors conducted 811 health education sessions, reaching 11,335 participants. These sessions emphasized integrating mental health with overall physical well-being, identifying signs of mental illness, and knowing when to seek professional help. Special community awareness sessions on topics like sleep and understanding the mind sparked lively discussions and encouraged individuals to share their emotional concerns with our counselors. Furthermore, our Arogya Mitras initiative trained 51 community volunteers offline, empowering them to recognize and refer individuals in need of MHPSS support promptly. Our ongoing efforts underscore our commitment to promoting mental health awareness and enhancing community resilience.

Yasmeen's Journey to Improved Mental Health



Yasmeen, a resident of Mumbai's L ward for a decade, faced early marriage challenges compounded by financial pressures and abuse from her in-laws. Despite adversity, she managed until pregnancy exacerbated her situation, leading to her return to her parental home. Over the years, Yasmeen completed her education, supported her parents, and fought for her son's future through legal channels. Her health deteriorated due to stress, resulting in hospitalization.

Introduced to Americares Capricorn Mobile Health Clinic, Yasmeen received medical treatment for anxiety and low hemoglobin, alongside vital psycho-social support over six months.

Counseling sessions with Sunita provided a judgment free space, addressing her concerns and fostering coping mechanisms. Yasmeen now enjoys improved health and mental well-being, actively working and saving for her son's future. While her medical treatment has ended, she continues visiting the Capricorn team for ongoing support and connection.



Mr. Pereira chooses Healthy Lifestyle




A 56-year-old resident of Bail Bazar, Mumbai, Mr. Melroy Pereira embarked on a transformative journey towards better health with the support of Arogya Sakhi. Initially hesitant, Mr. Pereira eventually agreed to health screenings which revealed alarming blood sugar levels of 400 mg/dl,confirming diabetes and hypertension. Prompt referrals and consistent medical care through Americares mobile health services enabled him to start necessary medications. Under the guidance of Arogya Sakhi he embraced lifestyle changes, including a diet focused on avoiding sugary and junk foods, coupled with daily half-hour walks. Regular follow-up visits and counseling sessions every three months further strengthened his commitment to managing his conditions effectively.

Subsequent tests showed improvements, with his HbA1C levels indicating better diabetic control and optimal lipid profiles. He expressed profound gratitude to Arogya Sakhi for her unwavering encouragement and guidance throughout his journey. With ongoing care and community engagement, individuals like Mr. Pereira can achieve significant improvements in their health and quality of life.

School Health Program








Our School Health Program, has prioritized comprehensive health education to equip students with knowledge on health, hygiene and nutrition. Concurrently, our health interventions have targeted anemia through screenings and nutritional interventions, ensuring students receive adequate support for their overall health and academic success. Regular vision checkups have been conducted to detect and address vision impairments early, promoting better learning outcomes. Additionally, our WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) upgradation initiatives have enhanced school facilities, fostering a cleaner and healthier environment that reduces the risk of infectious diseases. Engaging stakeholders, including teachers, parents and community members, has been integral to promoting sustainable health practices and ensuring the holistic well-being of our school community.

Urja's restored sight



Urja's journey began amidst struggles, her determination masked by uncertainty. Despite challenges, her spirit remained bright. During routine observations, our facilitator noticed Urja straining to see the blackboard, prompting action.


When vision screening at Rani Sati School was available, our facilitator ensured Urja participated. The ophthalmologist recommended further assessment at the eye hospital. With steadfast support, Urja's parents followed through, guided by our facilitator.

At the hospital, inquiries about family medical history revealed that Urja was adopted. Her parents, though initially uncomfortable, shared how they found her abandoned beside a garbage bin and legally adopted her as a cherished blessing.

Urja's vision struggles impacted her daily life, hindering activities like reading, playing and crossing roads. Diagnosed with severe myopia (-14 in her right eye and -15 in her left), prompt action was taken. Americares India provided Urja with spectacles, transforming her world. Free from headaches and blurred vision, she thrived in school, confidently taking notes from her seat.

Her parents found peace in her newfound independence. Urja's radiant smile now reflects resilience and the transformative power of support. High-fives with our facilitator symbolize restored joy and hope. Thanks to Americanes India and dedicated supporters, Urja's story is one of triumph.

Health and Wellness Centre



Robust national and local health systems are pivotal in advancing public health, with local health centers serving as vital entry points for communities and individuals. In February 2018, the Government of India launched the creation of 150,000 Health & Wellness Centers (HWCs) by upgrading existing Sub Health Centers and Primary Health Centers. This initiative is a cornerstone of Ayushman Bharat, aiming to transition

from selective health care approaches to comprehensive services encompassing preventive, pr curative, rehabilitative and palliative care. HWCs are designed to offer an expanded scope of se extending beyond maternal and child health care to encompass non-communicable diseases, page 1 and rehabilitative care, oral, eye, and ENT care, mental health support, and emergency and trau the primary level. This initiative includes the provision of essential services free of cost, ensuring access to quality health care for all.



Dr. Socorro Quadrose's Lifesaving Journey



Dr. Socorro Quadrose, a Medical Officer at Margao Urban Health Center (UHC), experienced a pivotal moment that showcased the transformative impact of upgraded healthcare facilities supported by Americares. Late one night, Dr. Quadrose encountered an atypical chest discomfort with palpitations, prompting him to request an Electrocardiography (ECG) despite the symptoms subsiding by morning. The ECG revealed alarming ST elevation, leading to swift action where the results were immediately sent to a cardiologist at Goa Medical College (GMC) for urgent consultation. Following a thorough evaluation at GMC, including echocardiography that detected subtle abnormalities, Dr. Quadrose was advised angiography, which uncovered a critical 98% blockage, diagnosing acute coronary syndrome. The wellequipped facilities, including the ECG machine, enabled Dr. Quadrose to be promptly diagnosed for ST elevation. Without this equipment, he might have ignored the symptoms as the pain subsided in the morning.

Dr. Quadrose emphasized that the availability of ECG machines at his own center averted a potential life-threatening event. This incident underscores how upgraded and well-equipped healthcare facilities can make a life-saving difference in critical moments.

Antimicrobial Stewardship

Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) presents a significant public health challenge in the 21st century, threatening the effectiveness of treatments for a growing range of infections. Project Parivartan addresses the pressing issue of AMR through a comprehensive strategy centered on capacity building, training and policy advocacy. By establishing Centers of Excellence, the program aims to significantly enhance infection prevention, control measures and responsible antimicrobial use across healthcare settings

The interventions include three key strategies in alignment to the priorites of national action plan on AMR:

Improve awareness and understanding of AMR through effective communication, education and training. We worked to impart customized knowledge, attitudes and practices (KAP) among healthcare professionals.

Reduce the incidence of infection through effective infection prevention and control. We created IPC action plan, protocols and designed policies for strengthening IPC, based on the identified gap across healthcare facilities.

Optimize the use of antimicrobial agents in health. By designing and implementing AMS programs across healthcare facilities. Americares also developed multidisciplinary antimicrobial stewardship committees and teams at various levels of healthcare facilities and implemented antimicrobial stewardship trainings. Furthermore, we established surveillance system for antimicrobial use and improved appropriate use of antimicrobials.

The AMS intervention aims to achieve the following:


- Reduced antimicrobial resistance by promoting judicious use of antibiotics.
- Improved patient outcomes by ensuring that patients receive the right antibiotic at the right time leading to better clinical outcomes.
- Cost saving by preventing unnecessary prescriptions, reducing the length of hospital stays, minimizing the need for expensive broad-spectrum antibiotics and lowering the incidence of healthcare-associated infections. Reduced adverse effects by controlling the use of antibiotics and ensuring its use when absolutely required.

Infection Prevention and Control

Preventing infections is at the core of public health and is also the best way to reduce the use of antimicrobials. Effective IPC programs can influence the quality of care, improve patient safety and protect all those providing care in the health system.

Americares is promoting healthcare worker safety programs embedded in IPC strategies. To ensure that the NCDC* and WHO** IPC guidelines are widely implemented in healthcare facilities across the country, we are building up a model program to strengthen AMS and IPC systems at **eleven hospitals across seven states** in the country, thereby promoting safe healthcare practices.






